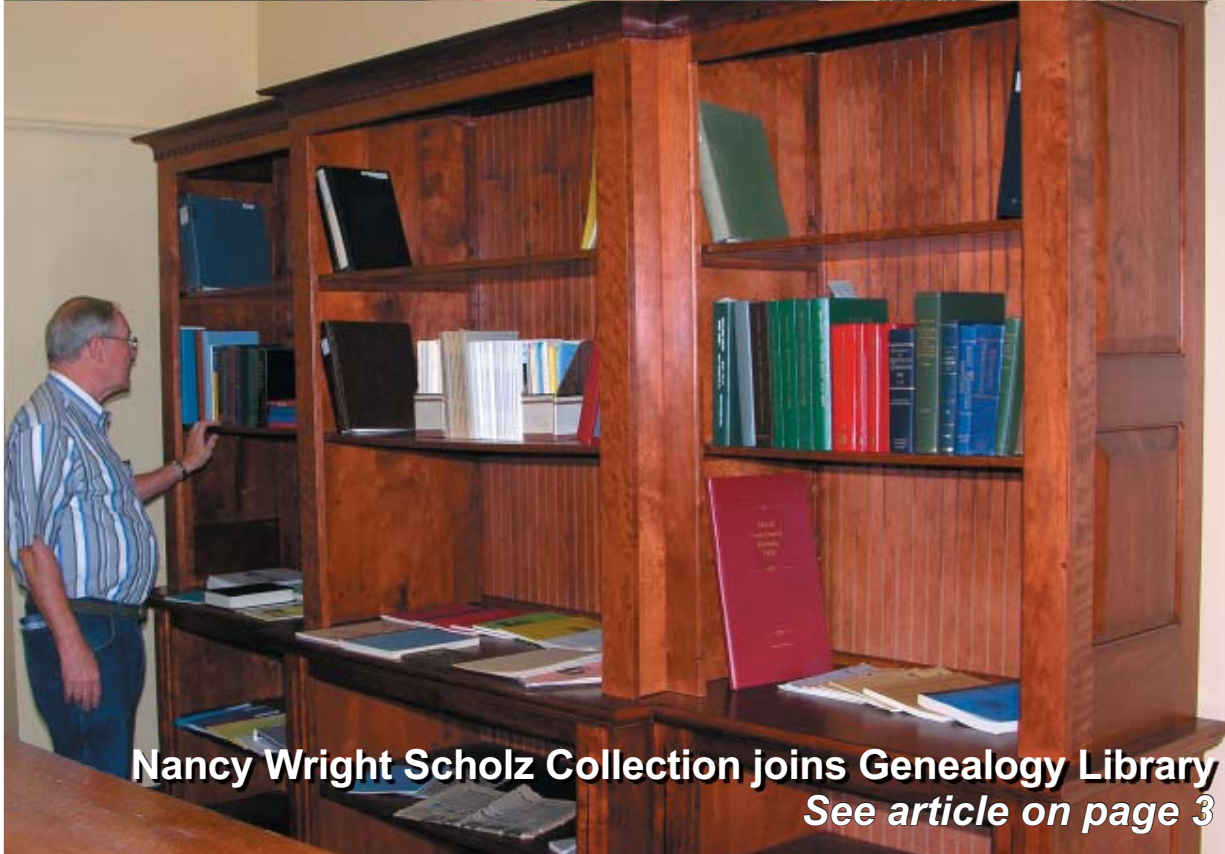

Genealogy Library displays Fergerson scrapbooks

The Genealogy Library now has on display two very interesting scrapbooks maintained by Lillian Hunter Fergerson. They contain newspaper clippings and community information that provide interesting insight into the life of a young woman living in Carlisle in the 1920s and 1930s.

The clippings and other information are mounted in large fabric sample books used by traveling salesmen calling on C.C. Cole Company. They were donated by Mrs. Fergerson's daughter, Kathleen Paris Mc-

Clanahan of Xenia, Ohio, and her family.

The museum and library continue to receive interesting and significant artifacts and documents relating to the history of Carlisle and Nicholas County. Newly restored wing of Neal Building opens

September 26, the Museum and Genealogy Library Wing of the Neal Building was dedicated marking completion of the restoration work begun in November 2007 with a \$280,000 Federal Transportation Enhancement Grant.

The grant required \$70,000 in matching funds that was enthusiastically provided by members and friends of the Nicholas County Historical Society locally, throughout Kentucky and in 16 states.

A reception was followed by a dinner and dedication ceremony. The ceremony recognized three individuals that have made significant contributions toward preserving the history and architecture of

Nicholas County and Carlisle.

The museum area was dedicated in memory of the late Joan Weissinger Conley, a charter member, long time president and guiding spirit of the Nicholas County Historical Society.

Mrs. Conley was the compiler/ editor of the popular reference volume "History of Nicholas County" and a third edition of this book is being published to further commemorate the Museum opening.

A section of the Genealogy Library was dedicated to the memory of Nancy Wright Scholz. Her family presented the library with an extensive collection of reference volumes

and histories of the Wright and allied families from this area and adjoining counties; products of a lifetime of genealogy research by the late Mrs. Scholz.

In presenting this significant collection to the Nicholas County Historical Society Mr. Charles Scholz of Quincy, Illinois, recalled his wife's extensive research all over the world and her fond memories of visiting Nicholas County and the enjoyable meals at Garrett's restaurant.

The event also marked the inauguration of the Carol Garvin Fund in memory of the late president of the Nicholas County Historical Society.

This annual fund will supplement income from fund-raising events, facility rentals and sales to ensure a base of support for operation and maintenance of the Neal Building and the Carlisle Depot, as well as funds for capital improvements to these

historic buildings under care of the Historical Society.

The immediate objective is to raise about \$100,000 to provide an elevator for handicapped and service access to the Neal Building second floor (Mozart Hall) as well as minimum restoration to the hall so it can again be used as a

community-gathering place as in the 1880's.

Three new exhibit areas opened

The artifacts from the depot have been mostly moved to the museum side of the Neal Building. This will be a long process. Currently we have three exhibits available for viewing.

In one exhibit area we hope to highlight a different town in Nicholas County every few months with your help in providing memorabilia. Currently we are highlighting Headquarters. Included in this exhibit is the re-

cently discovered time capsule from the cornerstone of the high school. It was placed there in 1938 and contains artifacts from that period.

Another exhibit area features "The Business of Carlisle." It contains letterheads, photos, and advertising from the many businesses in Carlisle over the past 125 years.

The third exhibit area features posters which Eugene Neal discovered on the second floor in the Mozart Hall. All have been removed, restored, and framed. These posters advertised performances in Mozart Hall and surrounding areas in the late 1800s. Also removed, framed and on display are several playbills and tickets from performances in Mozart Hall. These tickets, playbills, eleven posters, and photos of the graffiti found under and around the posters are now on exhibit.
